Is It Time to Declare War on Scrappers?

The Camp Washington Community Council has received numerous complaints about scrappers. The thefts and filth these criminals generate are not only a nuisance to residents, but is costing local businesses thousands of dollars. One Camp company has lost \$35,000 in stolen metal in one year. Another just spent \$10,000 in dealing with a local scrapper who tresspasses on and steals from their secured property.

Scrappers are destroying the hard work of the community council's clean-up efforts, most noticably on Marshall, between Colerain and Spring Grove. Gangs of scrappers hang out in front of the Sunoco Station every day. They use stolen recycling bins or abandoned grocery carts to hold the metal, often busting up the components on the sidewalk, leaving air conditioner, appliance, furniture carcasses.

Scrappers are one part of the problem. Scrap yards must stop buying stolen metal from these criminals. Scrap yard personnel know if a homeless scrapper or one of our regular scrappers is selling an unusual part (i.e., manhole) or a manufactured part (i.e., brand new copper tubing). They should not buy these items but call police!

The community council is helping State Rep Denise Dreihaus develop an anti-scrap law to crack down on illegal scrapping. It is simply not fair that law-abiding people continue to suffer for the selfish actions of a few.
