# **Rec Center Playground Burned Down**

## **Citizens on Patrol Starting in Camp**

The Camp Washington Community Council is starting a new Citizens on Patrol to further assist District Five police in fighting crime. "The drug sales resulting from drivers coming off I-75 and briefly parking on Camp streets is a major problem," said P.O. Melissa Cummins at the July 9 community council meeting.

A group of volunteers have already signed up and training should begin in August. COPs are rarely in danger from the bad guys, as judges support their efforts and cops are in direct contact during patrols. Officer Cummins often walks with the patrols in Northside. Patrols offer the cops another set of ears and eyes, said Captain Paul Neudigate. Call 542-1637 to join the patrol.

#### **Camp Washington Urban Farm Grant**

The committee to establish an urban farmer project in Camp Washignton continues to strategize. We are seeking more funds to help us grow and distribute fresh produce to fight being in a "food desert."

The Camp Washington Community Board submitted a grant application to the Dept. of Health & Human Services to establish the Camp Washington Urban Farm Project. Forty new jobs will be created. Our affiliates include the Washington United Church of Christ, Side Streams, the Cincinnati Recreation Commission, and Hamilton County/River City Correctional Center.

Three major components of the CWUF include: urban gardens on Monmouth and Stock Street, and a retail distribution center.

## **Hopple Street Bridge Construction in 2013**
