Freedom Garden Installed on Henshaw

Do you like fresh vegetables or salad with your dinner? Imagine being able to walk outside and pick them right out of your own yard! A "food desert" community like Camp Washington lacks a local grocery store, so most of us have to drive some distance to the store to get vegetables. This Fall, Teresa Irvin and her family will be able to do just that. They are the first family here in Camp Washington to own a Freedom Garden.

Freedom Gardens are 4'x4', raised-bed gardens, easily assembled and designed to fit in small yards. Teresa and her family will have freshly-grown food from the seeds they have already planted. The family will even be able to do some cold weather growing, as another garden bed was recently stacked on top of the first one, with a folding cover to protect plants from the cold weather as fall and winter move in.

The project is the brainchild of Bonnie Mitsui of Turner Farm. Turner Farm was growing organically and sustainably, long before it became fashionable. The Freedom Garden crew consists of Turner Farm gardeners Katie Charlton Perkins, Megan Hill, and, Sarah Harris, a local gardener who provides ongoing garden guidance to recipients of the garden beds. Juliann Gardner, owner of One Small Garden (1smallgarden.com), supplies the project with the precut, easy to assemble, red cedar beds and the cold weather covers for the gardens. Gardner also concocted the soil mixture designed to best grow vegetables. Bzak, a local landscaping firm, supplies the
